

TAKING ACTION ON OPIOID ABUSE BY INCREASING ACCESS AND QUALITY OF TREATMENT

The Opioid Funders Collaborative, which currently includes six Michigan philanthropic organizations working together to address the opioid epidemic in Michigan, proposes a public-private partnership with the Office of Recovery Oriented Systems of Care (within MDHHS) to enhance OROSC's efforts to establish a diversified system of care for opioid addiction treatment. The Opioid Funders Collaborative has committed \$600,000 and respectfully requests \$1,500,000 to fully develop and implement effective SUD treatment in office-based treatment programs and emergency rooms throughout the state.

The Goal

To increase and enhance access to quality treatment of opioid use disorder.

The Proposal

With funding and technical support from OROSC, the Collaborative will develop, implement and support the state's evaluation of high quality SUD treatment in a diversity of settings across the state, address barriers to effective treatment, and provide education and learning opportunities for providers that supports successful delivery of services and outcomes. The Opioid Abuse Prevention Fund has been created at the Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan (CFSEM) to receive and distribute funds on behalf of the Collaborative. Once fully implemented, the Fund will provide two types of support:

1) Grantmaking Programs:

Three grantmaking programs will be launched in 2018-19 to support evidence-based quality improvement efforts of opioid abuse prevention programs and strategies, including:

- a. **Direct Provider Support for Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT):** A grant program would be launched to support Michigan medical and behavioral health providers to develop and initiate, enhance or expand comprehensive MAT programs that will be sustained after the grant ends. The focus will be on organizations and providers that treat primarily low-income patients with Medicaid insurance or who are uninsured. Grants may be used to address significant administrative and programmatic barriers to offering MAT to their patients, including lack of access to personnel with expertise in delivering MAT, limitations in the number of people they can prescribe to, funding barriers and challenges in identifying licensed substance abuse providers for therapy. These resources will be targeted to organizations who are not already receiving similar support by Collaborative members, including MDHHS.
- b. **Culture Change in Hospitals and Emergency Departments (ED):** A grant program would be launched to support two or more pilot programs at emergency departments and hospitals to address missed opportunities to engage patients with SUD including screening and assessment, support for integration of addiction/behavioral health services, initiation of appropriate treatment and/or referrals, and managing care transitions when patients leave the ED or the hospital.
- c. **Expansion of the MI Opioid Collaborative:** A grant program would support the Michigan Opioid Collaborative to expand capacity to deliver technical assistance, education and training to grantees as they begin or expand MAT programs.

2) Co-Learning Opportunities:

In addition to grantmaking, we propose to initiate learning across providers by convening a learning network for purposes of sharing best practice information; and provision of training and coaching that support effective delivery of services and outcomes. In addition, a communications strategy will be built around the grantmaking and learning programs to share the information to a wider audience.

The Budget

The Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan, which is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, will be the sole grantee for all of the partner funders, including the OROSC. CFSEM will manage the grantmaking and other programmatic elements, steered by an Advisory Committee that includes representatives from each funding partner. CFSEM has experience managing other such funding collaboratives. Part of CFSEM's job would also be to arrange regular meetings of the funding partners to jointly make grant recommendations, as well as come to consensus on the plan for the Learning Series.

The proposed budget for this project is as follows:

Consultant:	\$25,000	CFSEM would like to hire a consultant with expertise in opioid treatment to help craft learning series and guide other content needs of the project. An RFP would be issued, and the funding partners would be involved in the selection of the consultant.
Evaluation:	-	Will be provided in-kind from OROSC
Communications:	\$15,000	Funds for an e-newsletter to keep grantees and funders connected throughout project; photographer and writer to capture stories to share with public on work.
Administration:	\$25,000	This includes cost of implementing learning series, managing grant programs, and coordinating communications plan with funding partners.

About the Opioid Funders Collaborative

The Funders Collaborative has a track record of working together, soliciting and identifying strong projects, providing technical assistance to potential grantees and ensuring that funded projects conduct a rigorous evaluation so that effective models can be replicated around the State. Our first initiative was the 2017 grant program **Taking Action on Opioid and Prescription Drug Abuse in Michigan by Supporting Community Responses**. Over \$570,000 was awarded to community coalitions to address opioid abuse in nine communities.

The individual funding organizations are Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan Foundation, Michigan Health Endowment Fund, Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan, Ethel and James Flinn Foundation, and Superior Health Foundation.

A partnership with the OROSC would expand the reach and depth of the initiative, bringing Department resources, including financial support and technical assistance to bear on this initiative.
